"Primary schools in London 'may need to merge or close' as intakes dwindle.

Report by London Councils says falling birth rate, Brexit and Covid-era flight from cities causing sharp fall in pupil numbers

The forecast is that the number of four- and five-year-olds starting in state primary schools will drop from 96,000 last September to 89,000 in 2026 – a fall of 7%. Falling birthrates are said to be the main cause of the shrinking numbers."

As you are probably aware from more recent news reports, Hackney have proposed closing four schools in the borough, two of them merging with others schools local to them. St Mary's is NOT one of the schools affected by the proposed closures. This issue has arisen because there are not enough children to fill all the primary school places available, which means budgets have reduced. This is a London wide problem as you can see from the headline above.

Although we are sad to see our headteacher leave, it has opened up other great opportunities for the school, to support it financially during this period of low pupil numbers and rising costs. We have been exploring various leadership options for the future, including working under an executive headship. Governors are working closely with the Diocese and Hackney Education to identify the best option and will confirm the leadership structure for September, as soon as possible.

We understand that this may make our community feel uneasy, as change does that to all of us. However, this is a positive thing for St Mary's as we have an opportunity to make some changes that will help us to continue to thrive, moving forward.
